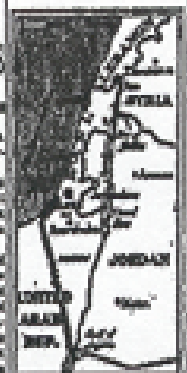

CAIRO, May 20—The United Arab Republic declared a state of emergency in the Gaza Strip today and made a joint declaration with representatives of 11 other Arab nations that an attack against one would be considered an attack against all.

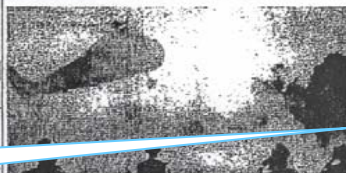

## Nasser Closes Aqaba Gulf to Israeli Shipping

Action Follows Premier Eshkol's Plea That Both Sides Pull Back Troops

CAIRO—President Gamal Abdel Nasser announced Monday night that the United Arab Republic had closed the Gulf of Aqaba to Israeli shipping.

Israeli earlier said that such a move would be regarded as an act of war.

Nasser bluntly dared Israel to start military action, as the Middle East crisis moved closer to open warfare.

"The Israeli flag shall not go through the Gulf of Aqaba," Nasser said. "Our sovereignty over the entrance to the gulf cannot be disputed."

"If Israel wishes to threaten war, we will be 'You are welcome'."

Nasser's statement, which intensified the tensions in the Middle East, was made in a group of U.A.R. air force officers at a military headquarters he visited in the Sinai Desert.

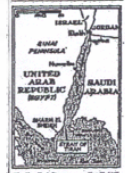

CAIRO, Tuesday, May 23.—President Gamal Abdel Nasser has announced that the United Arab Republic had decided to prevent Israeli ships and other ships carrying strategic cargoes to Israel, even passing through the mouth of the Gulf of Aqaba, Israel's only maritime outlet to the south and east.

"The Israeli flag shall not go through the Gulf," President Nasser declared. "It is not subject to discussion and we will bar it. 'You are welcome.'"

The announcement was made in a speech at an air force base in the Sinai Peninsula, where the Egyptian air force has based more than 60,000 troops. The speech was reported this morning by the authoritative newspaper Al Ahram.

In Jerusalem, Premier Levi Eshkol of Israel called Monday for a mutual withdrawal of Egyptian and Israeli troops from concentrations in the Sinai.

President Nasser spoke on the eve of the arrival of U. Thant, Secretary General of the United Nations, who is flying

does in an effort to ease the Arab-Israeli military confrontation.

According to Al Ahram, President Nasser said:  
"We are ready for war. . . . War might be an opportunity for the Jews and for Israel to test their strength against ours."

Israeli officials said last week that they would consider a blockade of the Gulf of Aqaba as an act of war. Mr. Nasser responded:  
"We are now free to face with Israel. The world cannot possibly accept a repetition of the conspiracy which took place in 1956."

After the first war of 1956, in which Britain and France fought on Israel's side, a detachment of United Nations troops had been stationed at Sharm el Sheikh, a spot dominating the mouth of the gulf on the western or Egyptian side.

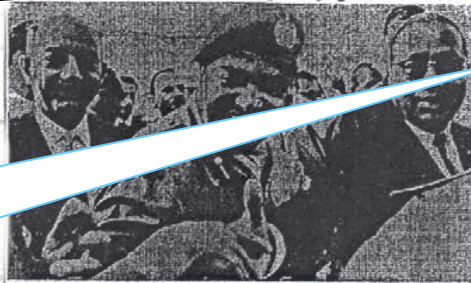

## WILSON AIDS U.N. ACT ON MIDEAST

Act To Be Used as Outline for Shipping if It Fails

LONDON, May 24 — Prime Minister Wilson declared today that Britain would "generally support international action" to keep the Strait of Tiran open to ships of all nations.

He reiterated the Government's view that the United Nations was the right organization to act in the event of a blockade by Egyptian forces in the strait. This has been the British position since the crisis arose.

Announcing the substance of the Resolution on the Strait of Tiran, Mr. Wilson mentioned a declaration made by Britain in the General Assembly at Geneva in 1951.

Britain said she had advised the Strait of Tiran "to be internationalized" through which the passage of all nations was a right to pass." She added that she would accept the right to be exercised and was prepared to participate in the proper organization of it.

## Small Kibbutzim Lie Under Enemy's Emplacements

**EIN GEV, Israel, May 29**—The very sight of this tiny border community makes military men shudder.

The furrowed brown hills of Syria form a forbidding wall immediately to the east, and the Sea of Galilee is a natural barrier on the west. Between the two lies a fertile, vulnerable strip of Israel some 12 miles long and perhaps a mile wide.

It seems impossible to defend, and yet for nearly 20 years it has been defended. In recent weeks, it is said, the Syrians have massed about 30,000 men along the frontier. If war erupts on the Egyptian border, Syria has promised to join in, and Ein Gev will have to resist a force more formidable than anything it has encountered.

This strip of disputed land is the site of the incident that ignited the current Israeli-Arab flare-up.

On April 7 the Syrians shelled Ein Gev and some neighboring settlements. Israeli jet fighters attacked in retaliation. An air battle ensued and, according to the Israelis, their French-built Mirage jets downed six Syrian MIGs.

### Almost Forgotten Border

Characterizing this as Israeli aggression, the United Arab Republic began the series of maneuvers that have brought the Middle East to the edge of war.

In the weeks since, while the attention of the world has focused on the Gulf of Aqaba and the Sinai Peninsula, this sector of the Syrian frontier has almost been forgotten—but not by the beleaguered people of Ein Gev, Beit Katsir and the other tiny Israeli settlements east of Galilee.

The residents need only look over their shoulders to see the Syrian guns. Mortars and other

artillery are set in emplacements and pillboxes along the top of the rugged ridge. The light sand color of the concrete contrasts sharply with the burnt brown hills.

The hills are a considerable Syrian asset. They are pitched so steeply that a Syrian soldier with a good arm could almost hurl a grenade onto the Israeli fields.

The border itself is not marked, but the people of Ein Gev know it as surely as if it were painted bright red. Benjamin Ben-Yosef, one of the original settlers, can trace it as if it were a line in his palm.

"It runs along the edge of that green field to the left," he told a visitor today, gesturing with a sunburned forefinger. "Then it climbs one-third of the way up the hills drops to the flat and climbs up again to those bare rocks."

### Once They Supped Together

"I first came here in 1937, 11 years before independence," he continued. "In those days we got along quite well with the Syrians. We taught them how to pump water and put in electricity, and they often ate dinner with us here."

The residents of Ein Gev and Beit Katsir have strengthened their defenses in recent weeks, digging extensive slit trenches and putting up concrete walls to shield the children's compound and the playground.

The mobilization of the armed forces has had roughly the same effect on the kibbutzim as it has on the large cities. Most of the younger men are gone and the work load has been distributed among the women, the children and the older men.

All but a few trucks have been requisitioned by the army, so loads are carried by cart or by hand.

"Our life is much more difficult now," said Gideon Zizit, head of the community security committee in Beit Katsir. "We must do the work in the fields during the day, stand guard at night and dig more trenches when we can."

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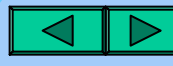
